<b>01. Cross-County Coordination and Rights-Based Food Governance</b> <i>Objective: Deliver food systems governance through a rights-based, whole-of-government approach.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Embed the Right to Food Policy across all relevant county departments</li> <li>• Use DAMIPEL and CSPMU as the central coordination mechanism for food systems actions</li> <li>• Align sectoral plans and budgets to food systems outcomes and rights-based indicators</li> <li>• Establish clear roles, responsibilities, and accountability lines across departments</li> <li>• • Monitor compliance with rights-based principles at ward, sub-county, and county levels</li> </ul>
<b>02. Stakeholder Participation and Food Councils</b> <i>Objective: Institutionalize inclusive participation in food systems governance.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Strengthen and formalize CASSCOM as the county food policy coordination platform</li> <li>• Operationalize multi-stakeholder platforms at sub-county, ward, and village levels</li> <li>• Facilitate regular dialogue between County Executive, County Assembly, and food system actors</li> <li>• Conduct public awareness and education forums on food rights and policy priorities</li> <li>• Document and track stakeholder inputs and policy responses</li> </ul>
<b>04. Food Policy Development and Harmonization</b> <i>Objective: Ensure coherent, adequately resourced food policies across sectors and territories.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Review and map all county food-related policies, laws, and strategies to identify overlaps, gaps, and conflicts</li> <li>• Align agroecology, nutrition, health, trade, water, and climate policies under a single food-systems framework</li> <li>• Integrate urban, peri-urban, and rural food priorities into county planning and budgeting cycles</li> <li>• Establish a periodic food policy review mechanism linked to CASSCOM and County Assembly committees</li> <li>• Build policy implementation capacity through targeted training of county officers</li> </ul>

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<b>06. Disaster Risk Reduction and Resilience</b> <i>Objective: Strengthen food system resilience to climate shocks and crises.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Integrate food systems into county disaster risk reduction strategies</li> <li>• Establish early warning and rapid response mechanisms for food insecurity</li> <li>• Align emergency funds and contingency planning with food access priorities</li> <li>• Involve food system actors and CASSCOM in disaster preparedness planning</li> <li>• Build climate-resilient production and storage infrastructure</li> </ul>
<b>10. Standards for Public Facilities</b> <i>Objective: Ensure safe, sustainable diets and water access in public institutions.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Review and update food and nutrition standards for schools, hospitals, and public facilities</li> <li>• Enforce food safety and hygiene regulations through public health departments</li> <li>• Integrate sustainable diet standards into public catering and procurement contracts</li> <li>• Ensure reliable access to safe drinking water and sanitation in all public facilities</li> <li>• Monitor compliance through routine inspections and reporting</li> </ul>
<b>13. Universal Water and Sanitation</b> <i>Objective: Achieve safe water and sanitation access as a foundation for nutrition and health.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Map water access and sanitation gaps across wards and vulnerable communities</li> <li>• Prioritize investment in boreholes, piped water, and small-scale irrigation systems</li> <li>• Expand WASH programmes in schools, ECDE centers, markets, and health facilities</li> <li>• Engage civil society and community groups in water management and maintenance</li> <li>• Monitor water quality and sanitation indicators as part of food and nutrition reporting</li> </ul>
<b>22. Ecosystem-Based Land Use</b> <i>Objective: Guide land use planning using holistic, ecosystem-based approaches.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Map agricultural, ecological, and settlement zones using GIS and ecosystem criteria</li> <li>• Integrate agroecology and biodiversity objectives into spatial and land-use plans</li> <li>• Enforce wetland, riparian, and biodiversity protection regulations</li> </ul>

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Promote landscape-level planning linking agriculture, water, forests, and livelihoods</li> <li>Support community stewardship initiatives for ecosystem conservation</li> </ul>
<b>26. Water Reuse in Agriculture</b> <i>Objective: Promote circular water use while protecting health and ecosystems.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Develop policies and guidelines for safe wastewater reuse in agriculture</li> <li>Pilot grey-water and treated wastewater reuse projects with farmer groups</li> <li>Train farmers and extension officers on safe reuse practices</li> <li>Integrate water reuse into climate resilience and agroecology programmes</li> <li>Monitor environmental and public health impacts of reuse initiatives</li> </ul>
<b>29. Food Control Systems</b> <i>Objective: Strengthen food safety, market access, and consumer protection.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Review and harmonize county food safety legislation and enforcement procedures</li> <li>Train food inspectors, market officials, and informal traders on food safety standards</li> <li>Reduce regulatory barriers that exclude smallholder producers from markets</li> <li>Integrate food safety, health, and environmental considerations in inspections</li> <li>Establish transparent reporting and grievance mechanisms for food safety issues</li> </ul>
